NEW YEAR'S RECEPTION JANUARY 26, 2024



Starting from 8:00 PM on January 26, 2024, the New Year's reception is open for all neighbors.

The board of the Maredijk Neighborhood Association invites you to join us at the beginning of the new year for the New Year's reception at the Maredijk House. If you haven't been in the neighborhood for long, then it's nice to meet fellow neighbors, but it's also a great time to wish each other a happy 2024!

ROOM RENTALS: Tentative opening?

Many local residents are concerned about further room rental and housing splitting, especially in the Poelgeeststraat, Schutterstraat, Vendelstraat, and Maredijk. They see a loss of balance between permanent and temporary housing, which puts social cohesion and livability under pressure. The City Council proposed a package of housing measures aimed at a fair housing market and preserving livability. The final discussion of this package took place in the City Council on December 21.

In the preceding process, the neighborhood association, in consultation with residents, submitted an opinion in October (see our website) and decided to speak at the Urban Development committee meeting on November 23. Bert van Sprundel (Schutterstraat) took on this role as a Citizen Speaker.

Subsequently, the neighborhood committee decided to discuss the Maredijk neighborhood situation with the political factions in the City Council. Several factions (D66, PvdA, CU, Partij Sleutelstad, and GroenLinks) came to see the room rental situation firsthand. On December 14, the substantive discussion of the regulation took place in the committee meeting. Our neighborhood group summarized our considerations in the form of a motion and sent it to all committee members.



The ordinance includes many positive elements such as a mandatory rental permit, a central reporting point for all housing issues, and an increase in the buyout protection limit threshold, from a WOZ value of €355,000 to €435,000. Below this threshold, buyers are obligated to live in the property themselves. Thus, starters on the housing market get a fairer chance. However, above this threshold, room rental and splitting can still continue.

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MAKE YOUR HOME MORE SUSTAINABLE WITH NEIGHBOURHOOD HELP

Hey Aad, so you've also got solar panels?

Indeed, since September 2019 I have 9 panels on our flat roof and since then I have generated almost 13,000 kWh, about 3,000 kWh annually, depending on the number of hours of sunshine. When I bought them I could reclaim the VAT because I feed energy in to the grid. I see that as a subsidy of 21%; certainly interesting and according to me still applicable.

And you, do you also have solar panels?

Ester: yes, but they were already there when we bought the house. We have 5 on the roof. Besides, I also bought an extra two solar panels, free in name, via my energy provider. Very nice to see how much energy I generate. It's pretty good.

You also keep tabs on that?

Yes indeed. Sometimes I check my energy use every day (especially in the summer), but mostly once a week, and especially the yield of the solar panels. The provider has a handy app to track everything. With this I save so much that already the past couple of years I just about break even on my energy consumption, and even get money back.

Ester: How funny! Me too, I generate more energy than I use.

Have you actually done anything else to insulate your home or make it more sustainable?

Yes, I put foil behind the radiators, replaced almost all the lights with LED lamps, set the thermostat at 19 degrees C maximum and the water temperature of the boiler at 65 degrees C, and replaced the plissé at the back with a version with extra foil in order to further reduce heat loss. Besides that we close the curtains at night in order to keep out the cold. Eventually replacing the windowpanes is a point of special interest. Our double glazing is somewhat outdated. But to replace everything is expensive.

How do you want to make your home even more sustainable?

Ester: I would really like double-glazed HR windows, but I don't yet know how to go about this. For example, can I get a subsidy for that? And didn't Ad van der Steld say something the other day about Fineo glass? What is that? Perhaps a good idea to discuss this with others in the neighbourhood to see how we can help each other take the next step in saving energy and money.

Aad: According to me there are various subsidy schemes, but how they work, I still have to look into that further. We can get local bodies such as Energiek Leiden to help and advise us.

Appeal

Together with the sustainability team in our neighbourhood we want to do everything we can to make the houses in our neighbourhood more sustainable. Aad, Ad, Leo and Ester are busy organising a meeting about sustainability, probably sometime in spring. Energiek Leiden is helping us, and we are also looking at what other neighbourhood associations are doing. Would you like to know more, do you have ideas or particular questions, let us know. Together we can then ensure that it's a good meeting that is in line with your questions and needs.

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The discussion about imposing a licensing permit for the further division of houses into separately rented rooms, with a limit per street, was more heated. In the housing regulation a licensing permit is no longer required for the Station district (which includes the Maredijk neighbourhood). The applicable livability figures, averaged over the whole Station district, do not give cause for great concern.

Consequently, the Maredijk neighbourhood has been fully released for the further division of houses into separately rented rooms. Many

councillors supported our case, the neighbourhood was referred to at least twenty times in various pleas to do justice to our situation. The fact is that while the vulnerable situation in the old core is generally recognised, it is further jeopardised because of the district-level approach chosen.

Alderman Terpstra, who incidentally knows the Maredijk neighbourhood well, stuck to legal and systems arguments. The discussion ultimately resulted in a large majority for the motion tabled by Vos/Van Diepen to carry out an investigation into a zoning of neighbourhoods and districts which is effective for the policy of property conversion into rooms for rent. Another motion proposed by Vos/Krol to assign a permit obligation and quotum to the Maredijk neighbourhood straightaway was deemed too premature.

With respect to the issue of property conversion into rooms for rent we especially owe thanks to Messrs. Vos (PS), Kargin (GL), Otten (PvdA) and Krol (CU). Other councillors,

too, did preliminary work, our thanks goes to Ms. Jordan (D66) and Mr. Vet (CU). All municipal deliberations can be found on Parlaeus Leiden.

We remain on the alert! We will immediately notify the municipality of any nuisance owing to bicycles, litter and noise. WILL YOU HELP TOO?

We hope that the municipality will involve us in the investigation into neighbourhood/district zoning!

Maredijkbuurt Leiden – The children of the Maredijkbuurt have their own reporter. For this month's newsletter, she went for a stroll through the neighbourhood in search of the best spots, this time together with Lena.

Lena is all set to go; dressed in a wonderful new skirt, she comes out of her house soon after I ring the doorbell. Her mum joins us on our walk.
